








- Co-hosted PCANC Learning and Leadership Summit in March of 2015. Report released March 2015.







Patient and Family Engagement


- Funded by The Duke Endowment

- Report issued July 2015, special issue *NCMJ* July/August 2015.







Mental Health and Substance Abuse

 - Co-published by NCIOM and The Duke Endowment.
 - Oversight provided by 27 Editorial Board members.

 - Approximately 170 people wrote or contributed to one or more articles in 2014-15.



North Carolina Child Health Report Card


- 2014 marked the 20th annual Child Health Report Card.

- Child Health Summit held in March 2015. Dr. Jim Perrin, President of AAP, gave keynote. Over 100 attendees.






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

 - All Payer Claims Database



- We also want to recognize the hard work of all the legislators, state policymakers, health professionals, and others who support the NCIOM and who have worked to address key health issues facing the state.



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
